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

CASTE CERTIFICATE

*Simplified OBC certificate process for East Indian Community by approvals at deanery level

*In Church records, new births to mention caste as East Indian in their Baptism certificate

*In School records, new admissions to mention caste as East Indian in their School records which will reflect in the Leaving certificate

Mutton Mince

Small piece of ginger cut fine
4 green Chillies (light green variety)

An Indigenous Bishop for the Archdiocese

Blessed and ordained priests from Mumbai's Indigenous Community were a common sight in each family. Each East Indian family generally had a family priest and nun. This year 2023, was surely a great one as all 4 ordained priests were from the East Indian Community. There is a great challenge to the church as number of ordained priests decrease each passing year. An urgent need to promote vocations is needed and also representation in the archdiocese hierarchy by the clergy from the Indigenous People. Local Native groups need to work towards supporting and encouraging community members to join the religious.

Indigenous People built the foundation of the local church and also the archdiocese of the native region. Every fourth or fifth generation of ancestors from an East Indian family have donated lands towards the church in Bombay and Vasai Diocese. We the Indigenous People are the pillars of the church and the migrants who came in later are it's walls and ceiling. If the pillars crack or are pulled down, the entire structure could come crashing down. In the same way if the founders of the Churches in the Archdiocese of Mumbai and Vasai are not given due importance, it will surely make the future of the diocese challenging on many fronts. The religious traditions and practices of the local founders of the church have at times been forgotten and ignored. At times they have promoted the migrant traditions to add to the wounds of the Indigenous People. We have heard reports of traditional parish feast days being changed, Heritage churches being renovated or rebuilt, traditional 7 day masses being stopped, Religious Traditions being changed or toned down like Irmous processions, Agera and singing of Krist puran.

Social media plays an important role today in the Archdiocese of any region across the world. MGP has communicated to the hierarchy about the importance of representation by the Indigenous East Indian community. The social media options like Facebook, YouTube, Instagram and Twitter give the community at large updates on the happenings in the local churches. The Religious Traditions have seen a major revival and this positive sign clearly shows how close these initiatives are for the Indigenous People. An online survey conducted around a year ago clearly indicated that the East Indian Community want a Bishop from the Native Community.

Hierarchy plays an important role in the decision making process. We have seen the effect on the local parish councils wherein decisions at times have gone against the interests and traditions of the Indigenous People, the East Indian Community. When a majority of the parish council members are from migrant communities, the decisions at times goes against the Indigenous People, their culture and tradition. There is an urgent need to have a special representation in the parish council from the East Indian Community, nominated by the local natives to ensure that their Traditions are preserved and protected. Likewise, we also need representation across the hierarchy on the Deanery level as well as the archdiocesan level.

On this issue we are finalising a strategy to promote leadership across in the Archdiocese. A Punekar should be the Bishop of Pune diocese, a Vasaikar should be the Archbishop of Vasai and a Mumbaikar should be the Archbishop of Bombay. We do not have a officiating Bishop from the East Indian Community in the Bombay diocese. There is an urgent need to appoint an East Indian bishop who is conversant in the state language, Marathi and also the culture and tradition of the Indigenous People of the diocese. The East Indian Marathi Mass needs to be celebrated across all parishes in Bombay diocese.

Preservation and promotion of religious traditions is possible if we have representation by the native East Indian Community in the local parish councils, as well as the Archdiocesan hierarchy. MGP released its first version of the East Indian Samaj Archdiocese - EISA Policy a few months back to list down the issues and needs of the East Indian Community, Indigenous People of Archdiocese of Bombay. We await a meeting to take things forward with the EISA Policy and at the same time are also working out strategies to ensure its implementation on the Parish and Archdiocesan level. A special plan to take up the issue of the East Indian Bishop in Mumbai is also being worked upon in a phased manner. An official communication from the MGP Team has been sent as a part of the initial plan. Looking forward to prayers and support for having Indigenous People representation in our Church to ensure promotion and preservation of East Indian Community Culture and tradition.

Mount Carmels Church Feast - Vandre(Bandra)

Feast day - 16th July

Parish Feast celebrated on - Sunday on or after feast day

- *This feast is celebrated at Bandra by East Indian parishioners and neighboring Community members on Sunday on or after 16th July
- *a Procession is organised wherein the priests are ferried in a tanga(horse chariot) with chatir(large umbrella) thru the Chapel Road till the parish
- *The procession is accompanied by the Confraternity of the parish
- *Local women are present at the procession dressed in the Traditional Lugra
- *East Indian brass band from the locality play hymns during the procession
- *Holy pictures and Betin(scapulars) are distributed during mass
- *Refreshments are served after the holy mass
- *The locals along with the brass band go dancing through the bylanes of Chapel Road as a part of the celebration
- *Traditionally the local residents throw buckets of water on those dancing on the streets as a part of the Celebrations
- *Locals serve refreshments to the band members and those dancing

Wishing all especially our Vandarkars a Very Happy Feast of Mount Carmels and we appeal to all Bandraites to continue promoting our traditions.

MOT MAULI CHA SANN - VANDAR CHA SANN Mount Mary Feast- Bandra Fair

A Bit of East Indian History..

- *It was the zeal of the native Christians (Agris, Kunbis, Bhandaris, Kolis and many more later known as East Indians) that popularized the Bandra (Mot Mauli Cha Sann) Mount Mary Feast.
- *In 1566 the Jesuits built a modest Oratory of mud and thatch and dedicated it to Our Lady of the Nativity
- *In 1739 during Maratha invasion this chapel was destroyed and the statue was allegedly dumped into the sea which was rescued by the local fishermen and kept at St. Andrews Church
- *In 1761 the Chapel was rebuilt and the statue was carried in procession from Mahim Church and restored to its original place on the Mount
- *In 1882 a glass enclosed portico was added to the Chapel for extra accommodation as more and more pilgrims came to the shrine to seek mothers blessings
- *In 1904 the new Church was built, an edifice in gothic architectural style was opened to public after 2 years of construction
- *It was the natives East Indians from Bandra and the islands of Salsette and North Konkan homeland that celebrated the feast of Our Lady of the Mount with great zeal and gusto
- *The Thursday preceding the feast was called the "Farm Day" when sweets and cakes were baked in all homes of the East Indian communities.
- *In those days specialty sweets were called Cucumber sweets called "Pan-Mouries" and "Umbers"
- *Pigs were slaughtered on this day and East Indian delicacies like Vindalo and Ser-pe-tair were prepared
- *A home brewed spiced alcoholic concoction popularly called "Khimad" was a "must" and was kept ready for the feast on the coming Sunday
- *The Bandra East Indians invited all their relatives for the Celebration of the Feast in reciprocation, those relatives invited their Bandra counterparts for the Harvest Festival "Agera" which would soon follow
- *Horse Tongas or "garras" plied from Bandra station to the very foot of the hill during the Church festivals
- *Stalls were set up by North Indian and Konkan belt migrants selling black grams and sweets. Also temporary canteens were set up alongside the pathways selling food and special dishes for the pilgrims.
- *It is said that the steps that go up the hill right up to the Church on the Mount was built by a Parsi Gentleman who had made a petition to Mother Mary after his wish was granted, and this childless couple were blessed with a child.
