EAST INDIAN TRADITIONAL FESTIVALS IN MAHARASHTRA

Aaplaa Gaav! Aapla Sann!

Gorai Vashi Island - Holy Cross Feast - Island Across Gorai Beach

The month of May holds special significance for the community, marked by numerous Cross Feasts which are celebrated at Holy Crosses across East Indian villages. Every year, locals travel by boat to Vashi Island off Gorai Beach to celebrate this cherished cross feast community tradition and recite the (ladin) rosary. The day begins with Holy Mass, followed by a hearty lunch shared among family and friends, a custom that has been lovingly upheld for decades. Many also spend the day on the island returning before dusk to the mainland.

Baravi Cha Sann - Ergal Cha Sann - St Bonaventure Church - Erangal

This feast has been held by the East Indian community for centuries. The annual feast is held on the second Sunday of January, drawing families from across Mumbai and nearby villages. At the heart of this celebration stands the historic St. Bonaventure Church, a symbol of deep-rooted faith and enduring heritage. Generations continue to uphold the age-old custom of gathering at nearby wadis (open spaces), where families cook on makeshift 'chulas'. They dance to the playing of the ghumat and consume khimad, the official community drink followed by a traditional East Indian lunch. The day is marked by prayer, thanksgiving, and a sense of togetherness that transcends time.

Built in 1575 by the Portuguese, St. Bonaventure Church stands as a testament to the region's colonial and spiritual history. Though it was destroyed by the Marathas in 1739, the church was restored in the 1950s, thanks to donations from well-wishers. The church is now in the care of the Parish Priest of Our Lady of the Sea, Madh Island.

On the day of the feast, the seashore in front of the Erangal church is transformed into a huge mela or fair with entertainment like giant wheel, merry-go-rounds, game stalls, horse rides and a variety of stalls selling local produce and food specialties. Private vehicles have replaced the traditional bullock carts.

Nasik Cha Sann - Infant Jesus Shrine - Nasik

The East Indian community traditionally travels to the Infant Jesus Shrine in Nashik to attend the Feast of Infant Jesus. The pilgrims attend mass followed by veneration. Usually a day out, devotees end up spending the day at the church premises, leaving in the evening, with many families picking up locally grown grapes before returning home. Several catholic local groups and tour operators organize buses for the feast. The shrine offers year-round accommodation to devotees, with some choosing to stay overnight at the shrine nearby hotels or home stays. Weekly novenas are held every Saturday, making it a spiritual destination throughout the year.

Killa Cha Sann - Vasai Fort - St Gonsalo Garcia

This Vasai feast is held on the 1st or 2nd Sunday of January at St. Gonsalo Garcia Church, Vasai Fort, honoring St. Gonsalo Garcia, Maharashtra's native and India's patron saint. The tradition, started by Rev. Fr. Peter Fernandez, marks the saint's childhood home and learning place. A mela or fair is held close to the church. The Maharashtra Gaothan Parishad (MGP) plans to seek restoration of the church and fort and proposes to build a museum and memorial in his honor, as part of its effort to revive village festivals across Vasai, Erangal, Bandra, Kurla, and beyond.

Ghormal Cha Sann - Barvasa Mauli Cha Sann - Our Lady of Hope Church-Thane Ghodbunder

Our Lady of Hope Church, Ghormal, stands on a hillock near Nagla Bunder, off Ghodbunder Road. Believed to be a private chapel, it was left in ruins after the war of 1737–1739. Once roofless, it was covered with an asbestos covering and doors for protection from nature's fury.

Older residents recall devotees from Kashimira, Bhayandar, Vasai, and nearby villages visiting the shrine on the Sunday after Easter, bringing water in earthen pots and picnicking under the trees. Pilgrims arrived by boats from Vasai and Uttan, bullock carts, tongas, offering fresh fish at the Offertory.

Devotees from villages such as Charai, K'Villa, Utalsar, Kolbad, and Horta kept the tradition alive. In 1995, under the direction of Fr. Dominic Pereira of St. John the Baptist Church, Thane, parishioners renovated the chapel and built steps up the hill. Today, mass is celebrated on the first Sunday of every month.

Trindat Cha Sann - Holy Trinity Church - Trindaz Powai

The Feast of Holy Trinity Church, Powai, is celebrated on the last Sunday of May and remains a major East Indian village festival attracting thousands. The church, located on a hill, now has a new building behind the ruins of the old church.

Founded by Jesuits in 1550 in the Valley of Vihar, the church was moved to the hillock in 1557 due to malaria. It remained operational until 1737 when it was damaged during the Maratha conquest. Legend says the original church lies submerged under Vihar Lake, where the top is sometimes visible when the water level recedes. Locals also believe that a statue of Mother Mary with Infant Jesus and a cross was found in the Vihar lake bed and it now rests inside the Condita church in Marol.

The Creado family from Juhu Gaothan for decades has been celebrating their Cross feast at the Holy Cross inside the church premises on the eve of the Church feast. Until some years ago they took a bus load of Juhukars for the Cross feast, staying overnight by settling themselves in the church compound to celebrate the feast the next day.

Manpesar Cha Sann - Immaculate Conception Church - Borivali

Our Lady of Immaculate Conception Church, Mount Poinsur, traces its origins to the 15th century and stands alongside the historic Mandapeshwar Caves (c. 750–850 AD) nearby. Founded by a Franciscan missionary in 1547, the church began as a 'devout hermitage,' with locals baptized by 1548. By 1630, around 1,500 parishioners lived in the Gaothan of Mount Poinsur, Dhainsa (Dahisar), Canary (Kanheri), Simpor, and Cassor. Around this time, the church's name changed from Our Lady of Piety to Our Lady of Immaculate Conception, known as IC Church. A colony with catholic dominance in the area and buildings came to be known as IC Colony.

The village festival is celebrated on the Sunday after the feast day 8th December, attracting East Indian communities from Mount Poinsur and surrounding Gaothans. This like many other East Indian festivals is a centuries-old pilgrimage and celebration tradition.

Karjat Cha Sann - Our Lady of Fatima - Karjat

Our Lady of Fatima Church, Karjat, is the first in Asia dedicated to this devotion. It has been a pilgrimage site since 1935. The statue of Our Lady of Fatima, brought from Portugal in 1920, was initially placed at the Karjat Railway Station. Traditionally, community members traveled by train or road and settled near a stream or open space during the feast. In 1978–79, the Fatima Express brought pilgrims from Bombay, though it was later discontinued. Today, some pilgrims stay at nearby resorts, home stays or farmhouses. A dedicated page for this feast appeared in the East Indian Calendar 2020. This feast is also celebrated at Imitri, Dongri.

Kashe Cha Sann - St Jerome Church - Kashimira

St. Jerome's Church, perched on a hill between the Gaothans of Kashi (Cassi) and Mira (Mirem), is the site of three successive church structures. The current church, blessed on 26th December 1926, continues to host its feast day then, though St. Jerome's official feast falls in September.

History books state that the first church, built in 1595 by Portuguese Franciscan Fathers, was destroyed in a cyclone in 1618. A second structure arose in 1628, serving parishioners from Kashi, Mira, Sanbojapal, Chene, Bandonli, Baroli, and Tantoli, until it was destroyed during the 1739 Maratha invasion. However, the statue of St. Jerome was preserved and placed on the altar of the third church built 1926.

A 386-year-old cross stands tall before the old ruins, with a new cross erected in 1926. The feast draws thousands from Salsette, Bassein, and Thane, featuring a fair selling local produce, sukeli (dry bananas), and ghumats. People of all faiths visit for blessings; the church was a refuge during a historic plague.

Not far away, locals as well as East Indians arrive in decorated reklas, tongas and bullock carts that add to the festive atmosphere, spending the day here. The feast also complements the extended Christmas celebrations, with Erangal Feast/Baravi Cha Sann just two weeks later in January.

Mumbai Gaothan Demarcation: A Step Towards Inclusive Development

Mobai Gaothan Panchayat, representing Mumbai's Indigenous People - East Indian Community are calling on the Maharashtra government to demarcate Gaothans in Mumbai, ensuring equal treatment and opportunities for growth and development.

They have also appealed for implementation of the Gaothan Extension Policy, as per the Maharashtra Regional and Town Planning Act of 1966, which allows villages to extend their boundaries by 200 meters every year to accommodate population growth. However, Mumbai's residents remain excluded from this policy, despite having vacant land in areas in and around Mumbai Metropolitan Region.

- Equal Treatment: Extend the Gaothan Extension Policy to Mumbai, ensuring equal opportunities for growth and development.
- Implementation Feasibility: Demarcate all Gaothans with a special DP Plan

- Improved Lives: This initiative will ultimately improve the lives of residents, providing them with access to basic amenities and services.

We urge the Maharashtra government to consider our plea and take necessary steps to demarcate Gaothans in Mumbai. We believe that this initiative will promote better' planning keeping Heritage, history, Existence and Identity in mind

eeping language as the primary focus of our religious traditions stands important, as many of the practices prominently use the East Indian dialect. Marathi should also be given importance as it is the state language of Maharashtra. A growing set of community members mention their mother tongue as English instead of East Indian dialect. While schools give priority to the universal language, the onus of teaching the East Indian dialect remains with parents and grandparents. If it's called the mother tongue, it basically means that the parents should make efforts, which remains a challenge. Many religious practices were followed in Marathi or the East Indian dialect, but have been subtly changed by a section within the laity and clergy with vested interests. The Archdiocese of Goa's incident regarding Marathi services during the Exposition of St. Francis Xavier was a clear indicator that we should give only prominence to our native dialect, East Indian and Maharashtra state language, Marathi. MGPs experience has been that if we stay quiet, our language will vanish from religious platforms, and we will then have ourselves to blame.

Restoration of heritage structures is finally being taken seriously. From the past, when religious buildings like the heritage Dadar Portuguese Church were demolished to make new, historically irrelevant structures by a team with misplaced interests, to a time when we see the restoration of our churches taking precedence. Heritage structures showcase our unique and rich design and architecture. In recent times, the restoration of St. John the Baptist Church – Thane, Our Lady of Grace Cathedral – Vasai, Mount Mary's Basilica – Bandra and St. Andrew's Church – Bandra are a positive sign from the Catholic Church in its efforts to preserve heritage and history. This restoration initiative need to continue across at all heritage churches in Archdiocese of Bombay and Vasai Diocese. A plan for restoration of churches in ruins at Seepz – Marol, Trindaz – Powai, Ghormal – Ghodbunder, Vasai fort and Erangal – Madh is also necessary, as many of our traditional East Indian village festivals take place in these heritage churches.

dentity and existence are critical, as a growing sign of migrant dominance is being seen across parishes. Decisions on hierarchy at the parish level are many a times taken against the traditional interests of the indigenous people of Mumbai, the East Indian Community. MGPs EISA Policy clearly states that parish councils should have an East Indian representative nominated by the local East Indian association to ensure indigenous people's traditions are practiced and thrive. Some of the recent controversial decisions taken by some parish councils are change of traditional parish feast days, discontinuing traditional practices, stopping East Indian hymns & prayers. Across parishes, a section of migrant groups, supported by the Church hierarchy, clergy, laypersons, and professionals, are showing signs of erasing East Indian community's existence and identity. It's high time we take due cognizance and react accordingly.

Singing of East Indian hymns, which were earlier the tradition, is now being targeted across parishes. Many of these hymns have been specially written for parishes basis their local feasts and patron saints. Parishes today have set up liturgy and choir committees who are unaware of the relevance of traditional hymns and the priests in charge also do not adequately do their research on the native traditions of the parishes they serve. The traditional hymns are being discontinued or toned down by vested interests with the blessings of migrant groups and clergy heads. Papiya, Veronica's Song & Krist Puran were traditionally followed for generations but are being either stopped, toned down, or the language changed. Traditionally, East Indian hymns were sung during novena and feast days, but now things have changed across many parishes.


raditions followed by ancestors for generations are vanishing slowly, and hence, the locals need to be vigilant. The East Indian community has a variety of rich cultural & religious practices which need to be revived and restored for future generations. While we must be accommodative and hospitable to the migrants at large, we just cannot forget our roots. Our traditional processions are unique, and some are organised in specific parishes on special occasions. The traditional East Indian brass band adds a local flavour of devotion through the hymns they play during processions. Any religious procession in Mumbai is incomplete without the East Indian band.

gera's revival is a clear indicator that if we do our very best, success will be surely be ours. MGP was one of the groups that helped revive Agera with its 100+ Gaothan network. Now Agera is bigger and better across the village, regional, and international levels. MGP now plans to revive other occupational based festivals and we will research and make announcements accordingly. Narali Purnima, a festival celebrated by our Koli brethren, will be reviewed, and the MGP festival guideline pointers will be drafted soon. Similarly, we plan to announce a traditional day for the East Indian community to be followed across on one special day or a series of important days for the community. Efforts to make Bhumiputra Dees (World Indigenous People day) bigger and popular are being planned too.

A section of migrants and a handful of our very own conspire to erase our history and heritage; hence, we cannot stay blind to this risk of losing our past. We will encourage and support the release of historical books and research papers. Archdiocese & Parishes will be requested to maintain a repository on the local church and its history. MGPs plan for a library in the Bhavan, or a museum, or an independent venture, will be re-examined. This library, dedicated to St. Jerome, patron of libraries and also revered by the East Indian community during the Kashimira feast, will include books especially on the East Indian community's language, culture, traditions, heritage, history, existence, and identity.

Village festivals are one of our community highlights as they showcase unity among East Indians through celebration and religious devotion to the village church. While some festivals at Erangal, Kashimira & Bandra draw the crowds, at the same time, we have some of our traditional village festivals being forgotten or toned down. Village festivals need to be better planned, revived, and celebrated on the local as well as the regional level. MGP will draft a list of these festivals and share it with the community to ensure its awareness reaches a bigger audience through social media. MGP stays committed to the revival of East Indian religious traditions, and the Kristaav Project will do its best to create an impactful platform. Without the support of local and global groups, this will be impossible; hence, we appeal for support. Let's all come together to keep our community flag flying high on all fronts—celebrating our East Indian language, culture, traditions, heritage, history, existence, and identity.




